A NOTE FROM DANA

>>> SPOKEN OR SILENT?

At a red light or in a hospital room?
Written or embodied?
On a meditation cushion or a church pew?

Back in Jesus' day, people were wondering the same thing we often get curious about...what's the best way to pray? So the disciples asked Jesus, "Teach us how to pray."



Jesus responds by teaching them a prayer that we recite in worship every week (Our Father, who art in heaven...) Whether you use the language of debtors, trespassers or sinners, the Lord's Prayer is familiar to most of us.

In a few short lines, this prayer acknowledges human imperfection, asks for help and forgiveness, and gives praise. Jesus teaches his followers this prayer because it is simple and to-the-point. He wants them to know that their words don't need to be fancy or flowing. In fact, he warns his listeners, 'When you are praying, do not heap up empty phrases...for your God knows what you need before you ask."

Poet Mary Oliver offers us some much needed permission and freedom when it comes to prayer:

just pay attention, then patch

a few words together and don't try to make them elaborate, this isn't a contest but the doorway

Prayer isn't a contest, it's a doorway.

If God doesn't exist separate from our real lives, then prayer shouldn't either. It can be less complicated and more powerful than you might realize. In fact, you might already be praying more than you know!

In Hebrew, the word *ruach* means both spirit and breath. So prayer can be as simple as breathing. Prayer can be breathing in the goodness of God and breathing out the stress and frustration of life. Prayer can be a sacred pause at a red light and the whispered word, "thanks" or a soft cry of "help."

Prayer can be something lived, felt, acted on—without ever saying a word. Prayer is the language of relationship, sometimes it requires words, spoken and honest and from the heart. Other times, you take a deep breath and trust that the Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words and *that* is your prayer.

Over the next 40 days of Lent, South Church will explore the topic: "What is Prayer?" You are invited to listen, learn, and experiment with prayer. Pastor Genna & I will be preaching on how prayer is personal, communal, imperfect, and continuous. We'll also have a special guest preacher, The Rev. Dr. Mary Luti who will preach on St. Patrick and the power of prayer (on March 17th). In this newsletter, you'll find many ways to dive deeper into prayer this Lenten season. I invite you to get curious about how you might try out a new prayer practice over these 40 days.

A DOOR-OPENER

>>> REFLECTING 20 YEARS AFTER THE OPEN & AFFIRMING VOTE

It was a cold and dark Wednesday evening—January 28th, 2004. More than 400 church members packed into our sanctuary. After years of conversation, prayer, and discussion, the top agenda item of the 293rd Annual Meeting of South Church in Andover was a motion to become an Open & Affirming Congregation.

In UCC lingo, this is when a congregation offers an explicit welcome and affirmation of LGBTQ+ folk as full members of the church. College kids cut classes and got rides back to Andover so they could vote. The confirmation class sat together with Jonathan Drury to observe the process.

Households showed up divided and torn by this issue. Some stayed home for fear of being hurt by the remarks of fellow church members. There was great anticipation and and trepidation that night. Everyone had to be signed in to the meeting. The press were asked to identify themselves.

Seven people spoke for the motion and seven spoke against it. Each was held to a strict two minute limit.

As paper ballots were counted, the congregation sang hymns, alternating between the red and blue hymnals. The moderator, Nick Warne, was clear that there would be no applause or response to the outcome—instead The Rev. Dr. Calvin F. Mutti, Senior Pastor, led them in prayer.

With a final tally of 240-161, South Church became an Open & Affirming Congregation. We were one of the first in the Merrimack Valley—one of the first in the country. This was before most churches were ordaining gay folk or opening membership to all. But it wasn't easy. In the wake of the vote, people left the church. There was a major capital campaign which floundered. There was a needed time for grief and healing and finding the way forward.

When asked to reflect on the moment, Rev. Mutti said, "It was courageous and risky...It was a dooropener that we couldn't appreciate in the moment."

The rainbow and trans flags in front of our church have made people feel more safe in the town of Andover, even without ever stepping into our sanctuary. Most of the people who come through our doors remark about our inclusive welcome. Most of our clergy and staff members would never have served here without that vote.

Without a doubt, it's been a door-opener.



ENGAGEMENT CORNER

>>> HABITS/ROUTINES/RITUALS

I began serving as South Church's Engagement Coordinator this past July. This experimental role was created in an attempt to adjust to the retirement of the church's faithful, longtime Office Administrator, Linda Hacker, while also providing a staff position dedicated to managing the expansive volunteer service needs and opportunities South Church is so blessed with. It's a position that I applied to fill because it seemed to be aligned with my personal journey. When the Covid pandemic began, I was a full-time pastor with a newborn son to care for. The demands of my work, my commitments as a partner and a parent, and the added weight of pandemic living amounted to a perfect storm of dysfunction. In an effort to learn how to live in this new time, I was blessed with a wonderful Occupational Therapist. We met twice a month on Zoom and slowly. over a long period of time, she was able to show me how I can make slight changes to my personal habits, routines, and rituals in order to live differently. Within a couple years, I had quit my job, moved my family to South Berwick, ME...and then I applied for the position of Engagement Coordinator at South Church.

I have spent the last 6 months listening to as many people, groups, and ministries as possible here at South Church, and what I have discovered is that we are all seeking similar things: Connection and Belonging. Whether we are looking for new companions, longing to connect with beloved friends, seeking folks to serve coffee on a Sunday morning, or organizing communities to fight for justice, life and health for all, we all want to be more deeply connected, belonging to people and work beyond ourselves. And yet, every day, we continue to live in an environment in which technology, economics, and all manner of cultural trends make it easier to remain isolated from each other. How do we hope to "coordinate" our engagement with ourselves, one another, and our God with so many obstacles in our way? We can take the OT approach: make small changes to our collective habits, routines, and rituals that will, eventually, lead us somewhere new.



THE HABIT OF CURIOSITY

Every day, we practice countless habits, tiny actions that become so familiar we don't even think about them as we do them. Let's make curiosity a habit. What is going on in the lives of others? What opportunities are there to connect? Am I feeling uncomfortable or dissatisfied? Why? Let's get curious...and do it enough that it becomes a habit.



ROUTINE LISTENING

A routine is just a long series of habits. Most churches have many routines regarding how we preach and teach. We are well versed in letting the world know what is happening in our community, and lifting up all the fun things we are up to. Now we need to adopt a routine of listening: What are the cries in the world? What are the needs of our neighbor? What is God calling us to set down or pick up? The more ways we find for listening to one another, the better equipped we will be to find common solutions to common problems.



RITUALIZED RECEIVING

Engagement is really about quality relationships. Relationships are built on the pattern of mutual offering and receiving, receiving and offering. We are a community of generous givers; we are glad to give of our time, our energy, our treasures...but how many of us are willing to receive from others? If we want to develop deeper connections with one another, then we are not just encouraged to go on Service Central and sign up to offer service...we are also encouraged to receive love, care and service from others when we have need. The next time you have a need in your life, you are invited to reach out to a pastor or someone in the church office, name your need, and let us help create a ritual for you to receive the support, the care, the companionship that you need to receive.

Slowly, over time, even tiny changes to our habits, routines and rituals can lead to major changes in our individual and communal lives. This is my prayer. Let this be our prayer.

INWARD, OUTWARD AND FORWARD...INCREMENTALLY!

A Green Team Update from Co-Chairs Mark Bohrer and Candy Dann

South Church is intentional about being good stewards of God's planet. At this year's Chili Cookoff, when Char Lyons spoke in Fellowship Hall, she talked about how the Cookoff organizers are working – incrementally – to have less waste by moving to compostable cups, and looking for a composting service to take the cups and the plant and meat waste for compost. This search is underway. The first incremental step this year was to use up the non-compostable stuff we already had. It was heartening to hear this, and to hear the goal and intention. Small steps, but always moving forward!

Looking Inward – Incremental Steps to Start Decarbonizing our Church

That same word "incremental" came up in the discussions to decarbonize the church this past year. In 2022, the Green Team funded Norian/Siani Engineering to do a study on converting the church to heat pumps. As the options in the report showed, it's a big project and a lot to think about, so we asked – "Could incremental "decarbonization" work?" They said "yes" that an incremental approach is reasonable. For example, an incremental approach could be installing air-source heat pumps for the first floor of the church. It would solve one heating system reliability issue we're facing, add comfort and also be a step to a sustainable church. The Facilities Team is considering this and other options and hoping to be able to implement it in the near future. The pace depends on the availability of funds so they need the support of the church!

Looking Outward – Sharing Ideas on Going Green in our Homes and Lives – Step by Step

Starting this February, the Green Team will have a table in Fellowship Hall each month to share ideas on a range of green topics. Our goal is to partner with members of the congregation – to share what we've learned and what you've learned (and done!) on things like:

- Where can I learn about subsidies that are available for insulation, windows or heat pumps for my home?
- How do I decide if an EV or a plug-in hybrid is right for me? What's involved in wiring up my garage or home for charging an EV?
- Should I think about switching to an electric induction stovetop?
- How can I make my yard and garden more welcoming to native species?
- How can I move toward a more plant-based diet, without giving up the tastes and flavors I like?

Looking Forward - Incremental Ways to Fund the Sustainable Church

In 2022, the church created the Green Future Fund. It is similar to other dedicated funds like Memorial Gifts, the Music Reserve, and others. It is open to anyone who wants to make a donation – as a memorial or a celebration or other event. The purpose of the Green Future Fund is to support the transition to a sustainable church, in keeping with our core belief to be good stewards of God's creation for all generations.

This year the church is gathering input from church members and exploring options for a Capital Campaign. Aspects of that campaign involve major facilities work the church needs, and most would move the church forward on the road to being fully sustainable.

Whether it's steps small or large, South Church finds ways to live our faith, always moving forward.


WITH A GRATEFUL, HEAVY HEART
